# From the Executive Director

2023 saw the Art Gallery of Mississauga moving onward and upward! Several successful grants enabled the gallery to develop a new strategic plan, which will guide us into the coming years as we transition onto our own IT platform and begin a consultation process to evaluate our fundraising, membership and sponsorship programs.

2023 began with the continued celebration of the AGM's 35th anniversary featuring a permanent collection exhibition – 35 Artists Marking 35 Years. February saw the opening of The Further Apart Things Seem - where 7 artists followed distinct paths toward subtle forms of resistance, while exploring areas of connection between that which feels disconnected or in opposition. Co-curated by Shannon Anderson and Jay Wilson, the exhibition was also co-presented by Contemporary Calgary, University of Waterloo Art Gallery, and Art Gallery of Mississauga.

In May, the AGM once again participated in the Scotiabank CONTACT Photography Festival in a solo exhibition featuring Mississauga-based artist/photographer Jorian Charlton. *Between Us* focused on Charlton's intuitive and collaborative approach toward exploring contemporary modes of Black representation through portraiture. The AGM also offered a successful Portfolio Review Day for emerging photographers.

In June the AGM took its ART HIVE workshop to the Streetsville Bread and Honey Festival and conducted numerous Art Hive Workshops in Celebration Square throughout the summer.

Over the summer we celebrated youth by welcoming a travelling exhibition from Montreal. *Tropicana* was produced by VOX, centre de l'image contemporaine, and featured the work of Costa Rica-born artist Juan Ortiz-Apuy. The exhibition playfully explored the language of consumer culture and advertising aimed at children, taking a humorous yet critical perspective on the strategic use of animals, colour, sound and shapes to appeal to youth.

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The AGM's annual fundraising auction took place in September and was a resounding success. Offering a carefully curated selection of pieces that were on display for the week prior to the auction, along with an exciting selection of silent auction items, we were thrilled to welcome guests to the gallery for an evening of wine, hors d'oeuvres and bidding!

Following our auction success the AGM welcomed the Clarkson Society of Artists who were celebrating their 60th Anniversary by displaying the work of their members. In celebration, a 60th Anniversary cake was shared by all at the opening reception.

2023 ended with our Annual Juried Show. Following an open call, the AGM was delighted to receive more than 300 submissions from emerging and established artists from all across Ontario. Jurors Noni Kaur, Sara Mozafari, and Ed Pien carefully assessed the artworks, based purely on the images and anonymous artist statements provided, to determine the final selection. This exhibition included sculpture, textiles, photography, drawing, and painting, as well as interactive, digital, and multi-media works. The artists tackled environmental and political issues; drew inspiration from philosophy, music, and art history; and conveyed the intimate struggles and resilience of their friends and family.

AGM programming included exhibition specific artist talks, workshops and tours in addition to our regularly scheduled Family Sundays, Art Hives, Tot Spots, Poetic Voices and 'Sauga Connections. School field trips returned to the AGM in 2023 and we once again facilitated an Intergenerational Art Project, where groups of seniors and youth connected through a series of online art workshops.

All this amazing work is done by a small but dedicated and hard-working staff. Their commitment to the success of each exhibition, workshop and event is evidenced by the increasing numbers of visitors. I would also like to thank our amazing group of volunteers, and the Board, for their support and confidence in my leadership of the AGM. I look forward to continuing to expand the reach of the AGM into the community and bringing them to the arts.

## **2023 EXHIBITIONS**

In 2023, the Art Gallery of Mississauga continued its commitment to supporting a broad range of artistic expressions, serving as a dynamic platform for contemporary art. Our exhibitions this year included: a group exhibition of artists who find fertile spaces of commonality amid seemingly disconnected ideas and mediums; a solo exhibition by a Mississauga-based photographer whose portraits expand the possibilities for Black representation; an exhibition designed specifically for youth that playfully explored the visual language of marketing strategies; a 60th anniversary showcase for the members a local art society; and our annual Juried Show of Visual Arts, featuring the work of more than 40 artists across Ontario.

Our exhibitions strive for a balance of different programming approaches, from expansive solo projects where an artist can be supported in presenting a comprehensive body of work, to different kinds of group exhibitions, including smaller, carefully curated thematic offerings as well as larger group projects that bring many different art practices together. With over 150 artists featured in 2023, the Art Gallery of Mississauga remains a hub of creativity, showcasing the richness and diversity of contemporary art practices within and beyond our community.



# The Further Apart Things Seem February 7 to April 6, 2023

In a social and political moment where opinions are often divisive, breaking into camps at polar ends of the ideological spectrum, the possibility of finding common ground can seem beyond reach. Debates over human rights, climate change, land claims, and even the politicizing of the pandemic often seem at cross-purposes and irresolvable. How do we respond in times of uncertainty—when do we push forward, when do we give up, and when do we try things differently?

In *The Further Apart Things Seem*, artists follow distinct paths that invent strategies of resistance, often pushing against logic to explore areas of connection between things that might initially appear unrelated or in opposition. By testing the unexpected and playing outside the limits of functionality, they embrace material experimentation and provisionality as productive spaces for building resilience, resolution, and understanding.

# Juan Ortiz-Apuy | *Tropicana* July 8 to September 3, 2023





# PUBLIC PROGRAMMING

In 2023, the AGM continued to expand and solidify its public programmes. We added some new programmes, such as Tot Spot and Poetic Voices, and continued with gusto the highly popular Family Day and Art Hive programs.



Tot Spot is a monthly initiative with the local daycare that welcomes young children (ages 4 and 5) to story time and art making in the gallery. The stories we tell focus on aspects of art such as shapes and colours—The Shape of My Heart, for example, was a favourite—and the children also explored drawing and markmaking afterwards.

Poetic Voices has also brought a new energy into the gallery. These are events that provide opportunities for local poets and poet laureates to share their work and engage with themes related to artworks in the gallery.

In February, the incomparable poet Nadine Williams stood in front of a beautiful photograph by artist Barbara Hobot to share her poems and teach a brief poetry writing workshop. We also partnered with 'Sauga Poetry to have an open-mic afternoon that included a recycled sketchbook-making workshop. When these poets arrived, the gallery was full of energetic young folks who were so excited to share their work.

In 2023, we received another New Horizons Seniors Program Grant (NHSP) and were able to offer several programmes to the public. One explored communication - Communicate & Connect (Online) and Artful Reflections (In person) explored memory. These programs were both intergenerational initiatives that brought together Seniors and Youth. Both groups enjoyed sharing their ideas, gently encouraging one another as they explored their creative process.





One of the biggest changes this year has been our capacity to welcome schools back to the gallery. One project delivered by artist Stephanie Schirm, engaged a large class to explore landscape with drawing and collage. The class filled the Main Gallery, and the students excitedly created their own landscape by tearing paper to collage it onto a board and then use drawing materials to fine tune their image. The class, comprised of newcomers to Canada, was encouraged to include landscape elements from their home country to make their landscapes more personal.

In conjunction with these programs, we continue to deliver engaging curator and artist talks to engage the public with our exhibitions. We also continued to deliver workshops to support our local artists, such as Portfolio Review Day and our Juried Show Preparation Seminar.
